#### **NATIONAL HISTORY**

Born of slave parents in South Carolina, Mary McLeod Bethune was educated in South Carolina, North Carolina and Illinois. Through prayers, determination and unbounded faith, she was able to open a small school using savings of \$1.30. Today, this school is a thriving institution known as the Bethune Cookman College in Daytona Beach, Florida.

During 38 years as college president, Ms. Bethune participated in numerous constructive efforts of her time. She occupied many important posts: director of Negro Affairs for the National Youth Administration, Special Advisor to President Franklin Roosevelt on Minority Affairs, and Special Assistant to the Secretary of War. Mary McLeod Bethune received eighty honorary college and university degrees.

Ms. Bethune founded the National Council of Negro Women in 1935. She considered the vast potential of uniting the power of 800,000 Negro women. She became the council's first president and served in the position for over fourteen years. Ms. Bethune passed away on May 18, 1955, just a few months after NCNW marked its 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Over its first 20 years, NCNW helped African American women to break down barriers that often isolated them from mainstream America. Through perseverance, the council helped make it acceptable for black women to be a part of national and international affairs. Through increased interaction with white female organizations, NCNW tried to unite all women as equals and present a more accurate image of American black women to the world.

Currently, NCNW has 240 Sections connecting nearly 4 million women worldwide through national and community based-health, education and economic empowerment services and programs in the U.S. and Africa.

The National Council of Negro Women's National headquarters is located in Washington, D.C., on Pennsylvania Avenue.

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# **Pomona Valley Section History**

On December 7, 1985, Jeanette Ellis scheduled a meeting of thirteen women to discuss the idea of organizing a section of the National Council of Negro Women in the City and Valley of Pomona. After two hours of discussion, the group decided to bring this idea into reality. During the next meeting, held on December 15, 1985 at Macedonia Baptist Church, Pomona, California, twenty-three women joined the organization. By April 1986, fifty paid members existed. The Pomona Valley Section of National Council of Negro Women was chartered in May 1986. (501c3 nonprofit organization)
